A Peek at Our Week

<u>Math</u>: Students are developing grouping and number relationship strategies through a variety of inquiry math activities.

Tip of the Week

 If your child is reading a story at home, ask him or her to retell the story to you in his or her own words. Retelling a story demonstrates comprehension, and many tests assess comprehension this way.
